## **Eligibility Criteria Alignment:**

- Projects demonstrate dedication to combating racism, anti-Black racism, anti-Semitism, and anti-Indigenous racism.
- Projects create a sense of belonging by acknowledging and valuing parents'/caregivers' identities.
- Projects respect parents/caregivers as co-collaborators, embedding their identities in the curriculum.
- Projects contribute to raising awareness around local food production and sustainable skills.

# **Project Participants:**

- Classes Involved: FOODS classes, ASD, DDP, Grade 11 Environmental Science, and Grade 9 Science classes.
- Staff Involvement: Brigette Cusson, Andrew McCrae, Rosetta Sciortino.

## **Anticipated Participants:**

• Number of Participants: approx. 160 (3 food classes, DDP, ASD, Grade 11 Environmental Science and Grade 9 Science classes)

# **Project Goals:**

- 1. Increase student compassion and understanding of Indigenous, Jewish, and Black cultures through food.
- 2. Raise awareness of diverse food options in the community.
- 3. Foster a sense of belonging by acknowledging and valuing parents'/caregivers' identities.

## **Project Objectives:**

- Bring Indigenous, Black, and Jewish parents/caregivers/elders to share personal experiences and culture around food.
- Enable students to cook culturally significant dishes with guidance from presenters.
- Engage DDP and ASD classes in planting and growing foods for future project sustainability.

### **Intended Outcomes:**

- 1. Strengthen visibility, awareness, and compassion for racialized/minoritized cultures.
- 2. Expand students' cooking skills and knowledge of diverse cultures.
- 3. Enhance the connection of parents/caregivers/elders to the school community.

#### **Evaluation:**

- **Methods:** Surveys with quantitative and qualitative questions for students, teachers, and community representatives.
- Facilitator/Speaker Cost: \$300 (Three speakers at \$100 each for the project's duration).

## **Budget Breakdown:**

- Materials: \$350 (Food and cooking supplies for food classes), \$100 (Seed packets for DDP and ASD classes).
- Facilitator/Speaker: \$300.

**Total Project Cost: \$750**
